The Big Question:

What is so important about baptism?

Break the Ice:

Marks of Identity

 Show the PowerPoint: Marks of Identity (attached), asking participants to call out what the marks signify.

Football Jersey Analogy

- Ask for a volunteer with a good sense of humor.
- Hand the volunteer a large football jersey to wear.
- Say: Now, wearing this football jersey does not make _____ a football player. A jersey is only a symbol that someone is a football player.
- o Suddenly, douse the volunteer over the head with a large pitcher of water.
- Say: In the same way, baptism does not make someone a Christian.
 Baptism is an outward sign of what has already happened on the inside.

Look at the Book:

- Jewish Ritual Handwashing
 - Say: Washing with water is important all through the Old Testament. God gave specific instructions on how to wash—for example, before worship, after sleeping, after contact with a corpse, and before meals. These washings, like many symbols in the Old Testament, pointed to the new ways Jesus brought.
 - You are about to experience the Jewish ritual for washing before meals.
 As you do this, think about how this washing pointed toward the New Testament washing of baptism.
 - Divide participants into groups of five or six, each with the following supplies:
 - Basin of water;
 - A cup,
 - A paper with the handwashing blessing (attached).
 - Give the following instructions:
 - Fill a cup with water and pour twice on your right hand.
 - Repeat on the left. (Lefties: reverse the order.)
 - Make sure the water covers your entire hand up to the wrist bone with each pour.


Supplies:

- Marks of Identity PowerPoint (attached)
- Pitcher of water
- Football jersey
- Basins of water—1 per group of 5 or 6
- Cups—1 per group of 5 o 6
- Copies:
 - Look at the Book
 - Handwashing Blessing—1 per group of 5 or 6
 - Anabaptist History in 3 minutes—1 copy

- Separate your fingers slightly to allow the water to flow in between them.
- After washing, lift your hands chest-high to dry and say the following blessing:

Blessed are you, L-rd our G-d, King of the universe, who has sanctified us with His commandments, and commanded us concerning the washing of the hands.

- Distribute handout: **Look at the Book** (attached).
- Say:
 - Some people ask the question, "Do I have to be baptized?" Think about Jesus—who is baptized when he has no sin. Jesus does this to identify with us, but he also chooses baptism to identify with God.
 - When Jesus is baptized, heaven opens, and the other two parts of the Trinity reveal themselves. The Holy Spirit descends like a dove, and the Father says, "This is my son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased."
 - God gives you the symbol of baptism as a way to stand in solidarity with him. Your baptism identifies you with God and brings God's pleasure washing over you.
 - Let's read more about baptism.
- Say: I will read the regular print, and you read the bolded print.
- Invite participants to work in small groups or partners on the Probing exercises.
